Lord Lisvane is a Liveryman Skinner and well used to City affairs.


Some 200 places have already been taken, and early booking is the best way to ensure that you do not miss the fun.



SOCIETY OF ANTIQUARIES

We 'hit the ground running' on return from the summer break with a fascinating visit to the Society of Antiquaries on 2nd September. We learned of the Society's history and were fortunate to view many of the *City* related books and illustrations in their library as well as Henry III's actual Magna Carta of 1225'. If you want to learn more about the evolution of the Charter and its present day significance, think about attending a lecture at the Old Bailey on October 30th, in the series Justice for All - 800 Years of Justice: Magna Carta to UN SDG 16. ROYAL HOLLOWAY COLLEGE

The following week we had an equally interesting, guided tour of the Master's university, Royal Holloway College, one of the first colleges for the education of women only. Its Chapel is a masterpiece of renaissance revival and as impressive as the college buildings modelled on the Château de Chambord, only much bigger (over 500 chimney pots). The painting collection holds many canvasses. Our guides were informative and enthusiastic; it was a shame that the tube strike meant that fewer people than had booked were able to attend.

30th October, 800 Years of Justice - Magna Carta to UN SDG 16
